

The Door and Hardware Institute (DHI) and Door Security and Safety Foundation (DSSF) Call for the Prioritization of School Safety Measures

DHI and DSSF jointly call on school districts and legislators to work with door security and safety professionals to assess and implement life-saving security measures following latest school shooting.

December 18, 2024 – Washington, DC – Following another deadly school shooting, DHI and DSSF emphasize the importance of door security and safety within schools and call on officials to prioritize security measures in 2025. For our own membership body, we stand behind you in your efforts as industry influencers to make your voice heard for changes in legislation that will help reduce or prevent senseless acts like this in the future. Together, we can make a difference.

On December 16, a teenage student and a teacher were killed and six more victims were injured during a shooting at Abundant Life Christian School in Madison, Wisconsin. This shooting took place within just days of the anniversary of the Sandy Hook Elementary School massacre, and is just the latest reminder of the importance of life-saving security measures within schools.

"On behalf of DHI and DSSF, we are devastated to hear of this latest tragedy of gun violence at a school," said Lewis Smith, CFDAI, President of the DHI Board of Governors. "While we recognize there are several influential factors involved within these tragedies, and circumstances vary each time, we want to re-emphasize our mission to advocate for actionable measures and safety precautions, specifically pertaining to doors and locks, which can and should be taken to mitigate loss of life."

As the leading bodies representing and advocating for door safety and security experts in the field, DHI and DSSF encourage school districts to work with certified professionals who are skillfully trained to assess and recommend door and hardware solutions that can ultimately save lives.

James Tartre, President of the DSSF Board of Trustees, said, "While safety measures such as limiting entry points or providing additional security are important options, the one physical thing keeping an assailant from entering any sort of building is a secure, code-compliant door."

Door security and safety professionals, many of whom are specialized consultants and DHI-certified, play a critical role in assessing existing doors and hardware, recommending innovative yet cost-effective solutions, and resolving door safety and security issues.

DHI's membership base encompasses design and construction experts, building code officials, local code experts, and professionals in the commercial door and hardware industry who



possess the technical knowledge, skills, and expertise needed to provide life-saving door and hardware solutions.

Consulting a door security and safety professional should be a basic requirement to ensure school safety. We encourage door and hardware professionals within the industry to join our efforts in amplifying this message by:

- Reviewing the <u>Are Your Doors Secure?</u> report, outlining recommendations for levels of security required for building openings – necessary precautions in the absence of national standards on the issue.
- Referencing DHI's <u>Ambassador Toolkit</u> consisting of talking points, sample social media posts,
 a *Letter to the Editor* template, relevant statistics, and links to valuable assets and resources to
 help raise awareness of the door and hardware industry and its professionals.
- Using key messages outlined in the <u>DHI School Security and Safety Policy Principles</u> to draft a
 letter to local school board members, the local Parent Teachers Association (PTA), and school
 district leadership. We recommend using the *Letter to the Editor* template, included in the
 Ambassador Toolkit, to help craft your letter.
- Focusing your message on proven best practices related to life safety and security as they
 pertain to doors and hardware, rather than any perceived failures.
- Communicating to stakeholders that you are available to consult in and assist with the decisionmaking process, knowing that they may be presented with numerous solutions in the aftermath of recent tragedies.
